Raven Recycling accepts clothing for recycling in red Clothing Banks located in the Raven Recycling depot. Proceeds from the clothing are donated to the Whitehorse Firefighters Charitable Society. Please clean, bag, and drop off all clothing, paired shoes, belts, and purses in the bins.

# **ELECTRONICS**

Many old electronic goods gather dust in storage waiting to reused, or recycled. Electronic waste cannot be thrown out as garbage because the hazardous toxins can leach into the environment causing ground water and air pollution. Sometimes reuse of old electronics is possible, but other times the only option left is to recycle.

Computers for Schools Yukon (CFSY) is the Yukon based branch of a federal government-led program that collects, repairs, and refurbishes donated surplus computers from government and private sector sources and distributes them free to schools, non-profit organizations and libraries/museums.

CFSY is partnered with Raven Recycling Society, which manages the public computer drop off and e-waste fee collection on their behalf. Businesses that have larger quantities or security concerns can call or email to make an appointment to deliver computers right to the warehouse.

Accepts only certain items for recycling. Depending on the electronic, there will be charges or a refund to recycle the item. All may be dropped off in the back yard. Ask to speak with Josh.

Check online for more details, but here are some examples:

Receive money back for Christmas lights, cables, extension cords, wiring, automotive starts, alternator and radiators.

Many items must be sent out for recycling and/or safe disposal. This costs money and Raven must charge tipping fees just as the City of Whitehorse does.

White Goods: Stoves, Washers, Dryers \$12.00 per unit

White Goods (with freon): Fridges, freezers and air conditioning units \$35.00

Misc e-waste: blenders, toasters, printers, vacuums & audio \$7.00

Flatscreens TVs and computer monitors: 29" or less \$15; 30" and above \$30

CRT TVs and computer monitors: 29" or less \$20; 30" or more \$40

Computer towers and laptops: \$15.00
